Hermanus Primary school is a parallel medium school with separate Afrikaans and English classes. We cater for children from grade 1 to grade 7. Our small classes of about 30 children, ensure a personal involvement in each child's progress, and encourages a love of learning.

Hermanus Primary strives to give every child the opportunity towards growth and development. The development of initiative and teamwork is of paramount importance in order to accommodate all our learners and their talents.

HISTORY OF THE SCHOOL

FOUNDING AND DEVELOPMENT

The first school was founded in 1868 and was known as "St. Peter's Church". The first teacher was Mr Soph or Soff. It was later known as the "Anglican Church School" and Mr W.H. Paterson was the appointed headmaster.

In 1884, Reverend Van Zyl founded the Dutch Reformed Church School. The first teachers were Soph, Telètt, McKlene and Knoebel.

In 1897, the St. Peter's Mission School and the Dutch Reformed Church School united to form the "Public School". Mr S.G. du Toit was the first headmaster. Classes were conducted in the Dutch Reformed Church Hall. The school had approximately 30 pupils and three teachers of whom Meester Paterson and "Swallow" Neethling were the best known.

Construction of the stone building below Hoy's Koppie began in 1907 and the building came into use in 1911 with Mr S.G. du Toit as headmaster, Miss Bredenkamp responsible for sub. A and B, Mr Paterson for st. 1 to 4 and Miss Neethling for st. 5 and 6. Dutch and English pupils were taught together in the same class.

In 1918, the school gained primary school status and became a state school. Mr S.G. du Toit occupied the post of headmaster until 1920. In 1921, the school became a secondary school and Mr Fick was appointed headmaster because Mr Du Toit lacked the necessary qualifications. In 1931, Mr Lomborg succeeded Mr Fick.

In 1941, the school gained senior school status. Mr B.J. Joubert (Oom Joepie) occupied the post of acting headmaster from 1940 to 1945 while Mr Lomberg took part in the Second World War. Mr Lomberg did not return after the war but instead became head of Observatory Boys' High School. Mr H.C. Jones took over as principal of the school from Mr Joubert in January 1946. The senior and primary schools were separated in 1952 and Mr N.P.J.S. van Staden was appointed as head of the primary school. Both schools continued to exist on the same grounds. In 1962, Mr B.A. Kuyler succeeded him and in 1978, Mr H.B. Nell was appointed as headmaster. Mr Nell retired on 31 March 1995. Mr J. B. Cilliers became headmaster in 1995.

A new senior school was built behind Hoy's Koppie and came into use in 1977. After many visits to the WCED and eventually with the help of Mr Lampie Fick, MP for Caledon, the old senior school was renovated and incorporated into the primary school.

On 1 May 1992, the school was declared a state-aided school.

Since 1995 the parents of Hermanus Primary undertook the following improvements for their own account: Building of the school hall, building of 10 classrooms, 4 garages, a tuck shop, pavilion, club house, cloakrooms, two admin blocks, three hockey fields, astro and automatic irrigation for the sport fields. Many other smaller projects were also completed.

In 2014, we built a multi-functional cultural centre of 180 m². Our vision is to further develop the arts and music with the facility. A staffroom for our ground staff, along with two new garages for our buses, completed the building project. One of our garages behind the junior block has been transformed into a new classroom.

At the end of 2022, Mr Cilliers retired after 42 years of service, 27 years as school principal. We are indebted to him for the excellent growth he championed. We were privileged to have Mr Du Preez lead our school during the 2023 school year. In 2024, Mr Giliomee was appointed as the new school principal.

ADMISSION

According to South African law it is compulsory for children to attend school (Grade one) in the year in which they turn seven years old. If parents wish to deviate from this rule, written permission must be obtained by the parent from the Western Cape Education Department.

ATTENDANCE AT SCHOOL

Regular attendance by the child is essential to ensure his/her educational progress. Absenteeism must be kept to a minimum. Dental or medical appointments should be scheduled for after school, and preferably during the holidays or weekends.

Please note that the educators cannot be expected to be responsible for making up work missed due to prolonged absences from school. If learners are absent from school for a few days it is again their responsibility to find out what they need to catch up, and to do so as soon as possible.

PARENTS VISITING THE SCHOOL DURING SCHOOL HOURS

- All parents will be expected to park outside the school grounds and use the official entrance to the main building.
- Parents will be expected to report to the secretary at reception and sign for a visitor's card.
- Interviews with teachers concerning the progress and development of learners must be scheduled at an appropriate time. Parents will not be allowed to visit teachers during class contact time. Please note that parents may not interrupt a class to speak to an educator or call a learner. If parents do need to speak to a teacher, the office will then notify the teacher. He/she will then make contact as soon as possible.
- Items forgotten at home will not be allowed to be taken to learners.

- Please sort problems out as soon as possible to ensure positive growth and development of

your child

- Please attend the first parent meeting of the year. At this meeting, you will be informed how to help your child with homework

TRAFFIC ON RAINY DAYS

Pupils have right of way at all times on our school grounds. By law, parents are not allowed to drive on school grounds. Your co-operation will be much appreciated.

LANGUAGE POLICY

Hermanus Primary is a parallel medium school. English Home Language speakers are taught in English and Afrikaans Home Language speakers are taught in Afrikaans.

PUNCTUALITY

Please ensure that your child is not late for school. It creates undue stress on your child, and disrupts the rest of the class; this in turn starts the day off very poorly. Late learners must report to the office before going to classes. School ends at 13:00 for grade 1 and 2 children and 12:45 on Fridays. Parents are asked to make after school arrangements from that time.

Grade one and two learners may not be left unattended between 13:00 and 14:15. Parents must make arrangements with an after-care facility to ensure that their children are looked after.

SCHOOL FEES

For 2026 the school fees are R16 280,00 per learner per annum. With the application of enrolment, you will receive a letter with more information.

School fees are used for the running expenses of the school, e.g. teaching materials, for repairs, water, electricity, maintenance of the grounds and sport fields, the purchase of sport equipment, stationary, salaries of staff not paid by the Western Cape Education Department, insurance etc.

CLOTHING SHOP

The new school uniform is obtainable from De Jagers, Main Road, Hermanus. The second hand school uniform is available from the school. The shop is open on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 13:00 – 14:00.

ACADEMICS

FOUNDATION PHASE: GRADE 1 - 3

The Foundation Phase is made up of 15 classes in total with 2 English classes and 3 Afrikaans classes in each grade. Our class sizes range from 30 to 32 learners per class. The foundation phase learners are assisted by various teacher assistants.

We adhere to the National Curriculum and Assessment Policy Statement (CAPS). The curriculum consists of Home Language (English), Mathematics, Life Skills and First Additional Language (Afrikaans). Reports are sent home to parents at the end of each term.

INTERMEDIATE PHASE: GRADE 4 – 6

This phase is the cushion between the Foundation Phase (Grade 1 - 3) and the Senior Phase (Grade 7 - 9). In this phase, the learner will no longer learn to read, but read to learn. Thinking skills and application of knowledge become the focuses of attention. In this phase the learner will encounter specific instruction in specialised subjects.

Subjects: Languages (English and Afrikaans), Mathematics, Natural Sciences and Technology, Life Skills (Personal well-being, Performing and Visual Arts and Physical Education) and Social Sciences (History and Geography). As set out in the DBE CAPS guidelines first implemented in 2013. Reports are issued quarterly.

SENIOR PHASE: GRADE 7

Our focus is on preparation for high school, in particular, we will be encouraging the learners to work more independently, take more responsibility, show a greater focus on their time management as well as study and research skills.

Subjects: Languages (English and Afrikaans) Mathematics, Natural Sciences, Technology, Economic Management Sciences, Life Skills (Personal wellbeing, Performing and Visual Arts and Physical Education). As set out in the DBE CAPS guidelines first implementation as of 2014. Reports are issued quarterly.

COMPUTER TECHNOLOGY

Our computer centre boasts “state of the art” network equipment, with 40 up to date and modern computers in a dedicated laboratory. Care has been taken to ensure that there is a computer available for every learner that visits the centre. Our Computer Centre will also be used to strengthen weekly maths intervention using the MCO platform sponsored by the WCED.

We follow a practical approach where we integrate the curriculum into the computer curriculum. Computer skills are taught through specific projects that link with the curriculum being done in class.

Our aim is that when pupils leave at the end of Grade 7 they will have a sound knowledge of the Microsoft products: Word, Exel, Publisher, Power Point and internet explorer. Pupils also have access to the internet to obtain information and knowledge needed in projects.

Currently all our classes are furnished with data projectors to further enrich the learning process. All the classes now also have direct pupil access to the internet when required in lesson work. Future plans are to equip the learners with tablets that will make learning more relevant, meaningful and fun.

We are also equipped with 40 tablets that is used to enhance the learning experience. We are in the process of buying another 40 in 2026.

ART

Each grade from Grade 3 to Grade 7 enjoys an hour of art a week in our well-equipped art class. We follow the prescribed curriculum during class time. Extra art classes are held after school where learners are exposed to different techniques and art mediums. These extra classes incur an additional fee.

LIBRARY

Learners from Grade 2 to Grade 4 visit the library for one hour per week. The Grade 5 to Grade 6 learners visit the library every second week.

The library is also open during second break.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT

SCHOOL BASED SUPPORT TEAM (SBST)

Each grade meets at least once a term, or as the need arises, with the teacher support team. The SBST advises the class teacher on how best to deal with the particular learning barriers the children may be experiencing.

A programme of intervention is then developed for those learners with specific learning challenges. The learner's parents are informed of the SBST's recommendation.

REMEDIAL LESSONS

Remedial lessons are offered for children who are experiencing difficulties with their schoolwork. The children may attend individual lessons or group lessons with children who are experiencing similar problems. The children attend their remedial lessons during the normal school day. Parents will need to pay extra for these additional classes.

SPEECH THERAPY

Children that have been identified with specific speech and language problems may attend Speech Therapy during the school day. The therapist liaises closely with the teachers and parents. Parents need to pay extra for these additional classes.

COUNCELLOR

We are privileged to have a counsellor at our school. Therapeutic and counselling services are on offer to the learners. Sessions deal with issues such as depression, relational problems, bullying behaviour, anger, anxiety, children managing divorce and general emotional difficulties. Written permission is obtained for children under 12.

SCHOOL ETIQUETTE

ENTRANCE TO SCHOOL

Learners may not use the main vehicle entrance to the school. Children may use any of the side entrances.

EXCUSE NOTE

If for some or other reason learners are unable to attend a planned activity or practice. it is expected that the learner will PERSONALLY excuse himself or herself from the educator concerned, with the necessary excuse note from either of their parents ahead of time as this is good manners.

TELEPHONE

The school office telephones are primarily business telephones and should be used as such. Plans for after-school activities should be made at home before the child comes to school for the day. Learners and parents may not phone from the secretaries' office.

Please do not phone the school to request information that has already been sent out by means of the D6 Connect. Please read these circulars and store them for future reference. It is most disruptive for the secretaries to have to continually answer questions for which information is available to all concerned.

SCHOOL RULES

School rules at a primary school need to be specific for the learner to have complete understanding of what is acceptable at this school. The majority of these rules relate directly to the Code of Conduct and the Pupils' Rights and Responsibilities. The rules have been incorporated to provide a happy, harmonious and safe educational environment for all.

1. LEARNERS SHOW RESPECT FOR THEMSELVES AND OTHERS

1.1 The following activities are **not** permitted at any time

- Swearing
- Skateboarding/roller blading
- Stone throwing
- Smoking / Vaping
- Chewing gum
- Use of alcohol
- Fighting (including play-fighting)
- Spitting especially on the sport field

- Use of electronic toys
- The carrying of knives or other dangerous objects
- Any behaviour that discredits the school, bullying, and physical or verbal abuse of others is not permitted.
- The carrying or use of drugs.

SUMMARY OF SCHOOL CODE OF CONDUCT AND DISCIPLINARY POLICY

1. CORE PRINCIPLES

- Discipline is a core value of Hermanus Primary School and reflects the school's character and culture.
- Every staff member shares responsibility for maintaining order, respect, and positive behavior in his/her class.
- Discipline is applied in accordance with the South African Schools Act (Act 84 of 1996, Section 8).
- The aim is to create a safe, disciplined, and goal-oriented learning environment where everyone's rights are respected.

2. MISSION

We strive to:

- Base education and teaching on Christian values.
- Promote academic, cultural, social, and emotional development.
- Maintain good discipline and open communication between staff, learners, and parents.
- Instill self-respect, respect for others, and good manners in learners.

3. LEARNER CODE OF CONDUCT

Learners are expected to:

- Be punctual and attend school regularly.
- Show respect toward staff, fellow learners, and school property.
- Honour school rules and authority.
- Participate in activities for which they have enrolled.
- Refrain from violence, bullying, foul language, or the use/possession of drugs, alcohol or tobacco.
- Represent the school positively, both on and off school grounds.
- Not use cellphones or electronic devices during school hours.

4. APPEARANCE AND NEATNESS

- A correct school uniform is compulsory unless an exemption has been granted.
- No jewelry is allowed except for a watch or simple stud earrings for girls.
- Hair must be neat:
 - Boys: short, not covering ears or eyes.
 - Girls: long hair must be tied up; no coloured or extravagant styles.

5. POSITIVE DISCIPLINE

- Discipline is administered with love, empathy, and an educational purpose.
- Learners are positively motivated through the L&R Discipline System, where good behavior is recognized by:
 - Positive entries.

- “Blue forms” for consistent good behavior.
- Certificates for sustained exemplary conduct.
- Examples of good behavior include respect, responsibility, helpfulness, and academic improvement.

6. OFFENCES AND DISCIPLINARY PROCEDURES

Minor offences:

- Failure to do homework, classroom disruption, disrespect, cellphone use, etc.
- Lead to warnings (green forms) and possibly detention.
- Serious offences:
- Repeated misconduct, bullying, drugs, alcohol, theft, assault, pornography, or vandalism.
- Handled by the deputy principal/principal and may result in disciplinary hearing, suspension, or expulsion.

7. DISCIPLINARY MEASURES

- Green forms: warnings for minor offences.
- Detention: Fridays 13:10–15:10; learners may not participate in sport.
- Time-out: learners are temporarily removed from class or school to calm down or reflect.
- Written warnings: for repeated or serious offences.
- Preventive suspension: maximum of 7 days before a disciplinary hearing.
- Disciplinary hearings: conducted by the School Governing Body committee; learners and parents have the right to representation.
- Expulsion: only confirmed by the Head of Department after a fair process.

8. ROLE OF STAFF

Teachers maintain discipline by:

- Preventive: well-planned, engaging lessons and clear routines.
- Corrective: calm, consistent responses focusing on behavior improvement.
- Supportive: restoring relationships and promoting positive behavior.
- Setting a personal example and always maintaining professionalism.

9. PRINCIPLE AND FAIRNESS

- All disciplinary processes must be fair, transparent, and educational, with the aim of improving behavior rather than punishing it.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

This is a summary of Hermanus Primary School’s Code of Conduct and Discipline Policy. The full official document is available from the principal or deputy principal for further inquiries.

2. SCHOOL UNIFORM

Uniforms must conform to school regulations.

- 2.1 GIRLS: Long hair and long fringes are to be tied/clipped back. School colour (dark green, navy blue) ribbons, scrunchies and hair pins must be worn. Hair may not be coloured.

- 2.2 Hair must be controlled in such a way that when a girl leans forward, her hair will not fall over her face. All hair should be tied back and be out of the girl's face, i.e. no loose bits of hair to hang next to the face.
- 2.3 The back length of hair should not be excessively long and should be tied in one or two ponytail/s. If hair is cut into a bob style and can be fastened, it must be fastened into a ponytail.
- 2.4 Hair extensions/weaves must not be too extravagant/big and must be tied back neatly. No coloured extensions are allowed.
- 2.5 Plaited hair/cornrows – no patterns allowed.
- 2.6 Afros must be neat and not exceed 10cm in length.
- 2.7 Buns should be fastened at the back of the head.
- 2.8 No dying/highlighting of hair is permitted.
- 2.9 No excessive use of gel allowed.
- 2.10 No nail varnish or cosmetics are allowed. Lip Ice is permitted but Lip Gloss is not allowed.
- 2.11 The only jewellery permitted is a suitable watch and Medic-Alert necklace or bracelet.
- 2.12 Girls with pierced ears may wear ONE small gold/silver stud or small sleeper in each ear. No pearls and no diamanté (bling) earrings allowed.
- 2.13 BOYS: Hair is to be clear of ears, eyebrows and collar. Should be neatly tapered and evenly graded. **(No gel allowed)**. No steps, no patterning with blades. Trends are to be avoided.
- 2.14 Casual clothes worn on special occasions must be school appropriate. This privilege may be revoked at the discretion of the Principal. Girls' hair is to be tied up.
- 2.15 School tracksuits with white tackies and white socks may be worn during the winter, Monday to Thursdays. Formal uniform worn on a Friday. The zip of the tracksuit top must be done up at all times. No tracksuit pants may be worn during the summer.
- 2.16 Rain hoods must be neatly folded after wearing on a daily basis.
- 2.17 The wearing of smart watches is permitted and if worn, must not be connected to cell phones. Smart watches may not be worn during assessments.

3. MARKED ITEMS

All articles of clothing and personal possessions and stationery must be clearly marked to enable easy identification. Clothing collected will be held in the lost property section of our secretaries' office. Children should regularly check lost property if items have been lost. Lost items will be sold back to the learner @ a cost of R50.00

4. REMAINING ON SCHOOL PREMISES

No pupil shall leave the school grounds at any time during the official school day without the written permission of the principal. This includes children who leave the premises before school to go to shops etc.

Parents are asked to address letters to the principal requesting permission at least two days in advance.

Parents will need to sign pupils out at the office before leaving.

5. LATE FOR SCHOOL

If a pupil is late for school, he/she must report to reception. If a pupil is late twice he/she will need to attend a two hour detention session on a Friday. Not for foundation phase.

6. CYCLING

- All bicycles must be locked in the provided racks. The school accepts no responsibility for any theft or damage.
- Suitable hard cycling helmets are to be worn by cyclists.
- Bicycles may not be ridden in or on any part of the school grounds.

7. RESPECT OF PROPERTY/SAFETY OF LEARNERS

- 7.1 The front foyer, staff room, copy room, main entrance and garage areas are strictly out of bounds. Learners may not play near the cars. During breaks, the learners must play in the designated play areas for each grade.
- 7.2 A teacher must be present, or permission obtained, should any learner need to collect something from the classroom during break, before or after school.
- 7.3 Class cleaning is a learner's responsibility and it is an expectation that learners will ensure that classes and desks areas are neat and tidy at the end of each school day.
- 7.4 There is to be no eating and drinking in the school passageways or classrooms.

(Not applicable for Juniors)

(During rainy days pupils are allowed in passages.)

- 7.5 Learners may not shout or run inside the school buildings. The rule of "**Keep left**" and walk quietly in single file applies.
- 7.6 Learners are encouraged to assist in maintaining a healthy, litter free environment.
- 7.7 Learners may not climb trees, fences, gates or walls.
- 7.8 Learners must respect the property of others. Nothing may be borrowed or taken without the consent of the owner.
- 7.9 A permission slip is required for a learner to move about the building during lesson time.
- 7.10 Permission for notices/posters to be displayed or distributed must be obtained from the Principal, Deputy Principal or Head of Department.
- 7.11 The school cannot be held responsible for any money or valuables that go missing on the school property. Money should be handed in to teachers at the start of each day.

8. ARRIVAL AND CLOSING TIMES

Pupils are to arrive at school in the morning before the first bell to line up as required. The first bell rings at 07:40. Pupils may not leave the grounds before closing time without the permission of the Principal. School closes at 14:15 for Grade 4 – 7, and at 13:00 Grade 1-2, and 14:00 Grade 3.

9. LEARNERS ARE PREPARED FOR SCHOOL

- 9.1 Permission must be obtained from the Principal or Deputy Principal for any learner to leave the school grounds during school hours. A letter of explanation must be sent to the school by the parents, should their child need to leave school during this period of time.
- 9.2 Homework is to be written down daily in a homework diary, checked and signed by parents in all grades where this is required. In certain grades Google Classroom may be in use for homework.
- 9.3 Sick learners or learners in a contagious condition must at no time be sent to school. Parents are asked please to fulfill their proper role as guardian.
- 9.4 Notes of absence are required on the day of return to school. Absences of three (3) days or more for medical reasons require a medical certificate.
- 9.5 Letters may be emailed to the class teacher.
- 9.6 Unexplained absence will be referred to the Social Welfare Department.

10. GENERAL RULES

- 10.1 Learners are expected of learners to greet all staff and visitors to the school.
- 10.2 Learners must stand up when adults enter the class or speak to them on the school grounds.
- 10.3 Learners are not allowed to speak during assembly.
- 10.4 Learners must be helpful towards visitors.
- 10.5 Learners must be respectful towards teachers at all times.
- 10.6 Learners are expected to stand up when addressed during assembly.

11. CELLULAR PHONES

Cellphones should not be brought to school. If for whatever reason learners need to bring their phone to school to contact their parents after school, all cellphones are to be handed in at their teacher to be locked away in the safe. The school uses its own tablets for education and learner cellphones are not necessary. Learners who are caught using cellphones on school grounds will be disciplined accordingly to the discipline policy.

12.2 POSITIVE REINFORCEMENT

It is important to recognize good behaviour or improvement in poor or unacceptable behaviour. This could be done in the form of praise, recognition etc.

12.3 DETENTION

The school discipline policy.

The deputy principal will place a learner on detention and he will inform the learner's parents by means of a detention letter.

If a detention letter is sent to the parents, it must be signed by the parents, acknowledging that they are aware of and are in agreement with the action that has been taken.

Detention is held on a Friday from 13:10 to 15:10. Note: Detention takes precedence over all extra-mural activities. We appeal to parents to support our school detention system.

12.4 ROLE OF THE PUPIL

To behave in a manner expected from Hermanus Primary pupils for example:

- To have respect for other people and property.
- To have good values and manners.
- To give of his/her best at all times.
- To consider the consequences of his/her actions.
- To have self-discipline.
- To be loyal to Hermanus Primary School.
- To have a sense of responsibility.

12.5 ROLE OF THE PARENT

- The ultimate responsibility for learners' behavior rests with their parents or guardians.
- The child's value system is formed at home.
- Parents are co-partners with regard to discipline.
- Parents set the moral values of their child.
- Parents are expected to teach their children manners.
- Parents should instill respect for other people.
- Parents should be loyal to the school and support it.
- Parents should respect the values that the school aims to instill.
- Parents should ensure that their child observes all school rules and regulations and accept responsibility for any misbehavior of their child.

- Parents should take an active interest in their child's schoolwork and make it possible for the child to complete assigned homework.
- Parents should attend meetings that the school convenes for them.

13. SERIOUS MISCONDUCT, SUSPENSION AND EXPULSION

13.1 DEFINITIONS

- SUSPENSION means the temporary prohibition of a learner from attending school.
- EXPULSION means the permanent prohibition of a learner from attending a school.

13.2 SERIOUS MISCONDUCT

Serious misconduct includes repeated absenteeism, disgraceful or improper behaviour, possession or use of alcohol or drugs, possession of pornography, theft, immoral behaviour, assault, or cyberbullying.

Learners found guilty of serious misconduct—after a fair hearing—may be suspended by the Governing Body or expelled by the Head of the Western Cape Education Department. All such cases will be handled in accordance with the school's Code of Conduct and Disciplinary Policy.

14. REWARDS

ACADEMIC WORK

Gold stars; certificates and prizes operate as rewards for Grades 1-3.
Top 20 achievement lists are issued quarterly for Grades 4 – 7.

ASSEMBLY AWARDS

Outstanding behaviour as observed by a number of teachers.
Blue forms are given to learners that show quality work, excellent behaviour and embodies the true spirit of a true Hermanus learner.

SPORT

GENERAL

- Coaching is mainly done by teachers. Due to the increase in pupil numbers we are obliged to make use of parents. In certain cases the school also appoints coaches that are remunerated by the school.
- A wide variety of sport is offered.
- Sport participation: Matches, sport days and tournaments.
- The costs are included in the school fees for athletics, netball, cricket, rugby, tennis and hockey. Tours will incur further costs which parents will be expected to pay.
- Teaching staff remain in charge of final team selections.
